The Strangest Home-Run Smash in Labatt Park History

Forty-six years ago when the wood-loving beaver became Canada's official mascot, the 1975 London Majors, skippered by the late Roy McKay, won the Intercounty Baseball League (IBL) pennant (20-8 record) and championship series against the Guelph Royals using a dynamite combination of pitching, defense and lumber.

In 2015, the '75 Majors were inducted into the London Sports Hall of Fame.

In fact, it was the last time The Local Nine won the IBL title, although the 1988, 2008 and 2016 Majors won the league pennant, with the 2008 Majors losing the championship series with the Brantford Red Sox in Game 7 before 5,200 fans at historic Labatt Park.

McKay's outstanding '75 club was deep in talent and long on camaraderie and teamwork. Two of its five all-stars were league MVP Mike (Killer) Kilkenny and slugger Larry (Haggar) Haggitt.

Killer was a tall, southpaw pitcher fresh from five seasons in The Bigs (Detroit Tigers, Cleveland Indians, San Diego Padres and Oakland A's) who still had all his stuff on the mound. He went undefeated (9-0) during the regular season and 2-2 in the playoffs with an ERA of 1.07.

First-baseman Larry Haggitt won the '75 IBL batting crown with a .412 season average.

According to IBL Iron Man and all-star teammate Arden (RD) Eddie, "Killer used to say before games he pitched, 'Just give me two runs and I'll take care of the rest.'" Getting a hit off Kilkenny was like trying to steal a pork chop from a pit-bull terrier.

Larry Haggitt, a powerful six-footer built like a brick outhouse, could really crush a baseball. "One night in '75 during the bottom of the 1st," says Eddie, "Haggar's at the plate and he launched one into orbit; a moon shot over the wood fence in right-field and out of the park."

As the tumblers of time would have it, Larry's wife, Rachel, who'd gone shopping at White Oaks Mall before the game, was travelling westward over the new Queens Avenue bridge on her way back to watch the game. Just after she arrived at the bridge's western end, a meteor-like baseball smashed into her front windshield. Or as Arden Eddie describes it, "the ball and the windshield arrived at the same Earth co-ordinates together and the ball and the windshield became one."

Only after Rachel returned to the park did she discover it was husband Larry who'd dispatched the ball like a cannon out of the park onto Riverside Drive. "It was funny as hell to everyone except Rachel and Haggar," says Eddie.

What are the odds of clobbering a game ball 550 feet into the windshield of your own moving car? Given that only one man in a million can even hit a baseball 550 feet, the odds of randomly smashing the windshield of your own moving car at that distance are astronomical. It's the only home-run blast during Haggitt's career that lightened his wallet at Apple Auto Glass.

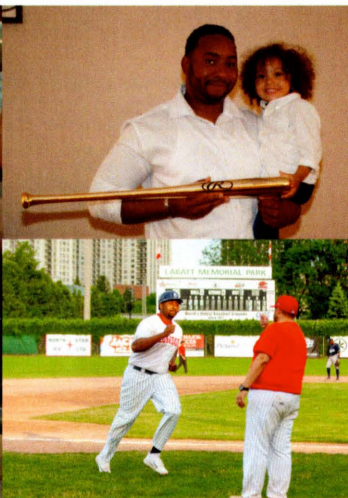

Teammate Barry Fuller contends Haggitt "also drilled another one that bounced off the old Dutch Laundry on the other side of Riverside," an estimated 590 feet from home plate, during another game.

"Haggitt was on fire that year," says all-star infielder Barry (Bougie) Boughner. "He hit that ball out of the yard in right field onto Riverside Drive and it's still going."

Baseball is a magical game of synchronicity, where playful Baseball Gods revel in creating unusual coincidences where split-second timing is everything. The field is the sacred stage, the infield a diamond. There's nine defensive players and nine innings. Runners move around the bases counter clockwise, but there's no time clock. Theoretically, a game can last forever.

When you think you've seen all the strange plays imaginable, another one unfolds before your eyes. As the late Yankee catcher Yogi Berra would say, "It's déjà vu all over again."

Two London Hall of Famers.

In 1937 and at the age of 17, Frank Colman won the IBL Batting Title and the IBL Most Valuable Player Award. In 1938 Frank Colman played for Stratford and London in the IBL. Frank Colman turned pro in 1939 and in his MLB baseball career he played for the Pittsburgh Pirates and the New York Yankees. Frank Colman and Yogi Berra signed a contract to play with the New York Yankees on the same day. Yogi Berra and Frank Colman were life long friends and right up until the day Frank Colman passed away. The year that Frank Colman played for the Yankees they won the World Series - however, Frank didn't get to play in any of the World Series games and I believe that it was because Frank was injured and couldn't play because of his injury. The rule of thumb in those days was - if you didn't play you didn't get a playoff share. However, Frank Colman was so well liked by all of his Yankee teammates - they voted for him to get a full share. In 1954 and after Frank Colman retired from playing and managing in pro baseball, he returned to London and became the manager /player for the 1954 London Majors. In 1955 Frank Colman and his brother Jack bought the London Majors from Clare Van Horne and Bill Farquharson and owned the team until January of 1960. In 1956 the London Majors won the IBL Championship under the guidance of Frank and Jack Colman.

When the 1957 season began the London Majors refused to field a team in the IBL and decided to play in the Great Lakes League and the Brantford Red Sox also moved their team to the Great Lakes League. The reason why the London Majors refused to field a team in the IBL was - the IBL sent the London Majors a cheque for about \$65.00 or \$70.00 which was considered to be their share of the playoff gate receipts. The London Majors packed Labatt Park in the playoffs and were not happy with a measly \$70.00 - hence, they decided to play in the Great Lakes League in 1957. In 1957 the London Majors won the Great Lakes Championship. In 1958 the London Majors and the Brantford Red Sox returned to the IBL. When the London Majors won the IBL Championship in 1956 - they refused to return the IBL Championship Trophy to the IBL that was given out to the IBL Championship teams from 1920 to 1956.

In 2017, Sandy Wagtar { The daughter of Jack Colman } decided that the 1920 IBL Championship Trophy should have a real home instead of sitting in her basement forever.

Sandy Wagtar gave the IBL Championship Trophy to the London Majors, Alumni and the 102 year old IBL CHAMPIONSHIP TROPHY will stay in the Alumni's possession.

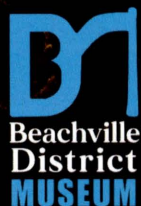

The Rumble at the Riverforks

Majors' coach Norm Aldridge at "The Rumble at the Riverforks" at Labatt Park on Sun. May 31, 1998 ~ a fundraising slo-pitch game between the London Majors' Alumni and members of London city council/ members of the local media.

The exhibition game raised just under \$2,000 toward the City of London's significant expense of installing a new cedar-shake roof on the Roy McKay Clubhouse ~ despite a reduced crowd in the stands due to the morning monsoon that day in London, with the sun eventually coming about 11 am for the 2 pm game. Only \$2 was charged for admission at the front gate and Viking Horns were passed throughout the crowd of about 225 for extra donations.

The game was organized by Arden Eddie of the London Majors and Barry Wells, news editor of SCENE magazine.

Fergie is in the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown and the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum - in St Mary's, Ontario.

Fergie Jenkins pitched for the London Majors in 1984 and for several games in 1985. Fergie came to the London Majors in 1984 after retiring from Major League Baseball in 1983.

During my time with the London Pontiacs, London Avco's and the London Majors -from 1966 to 1985 I played with several Major League stars that included Denny McLain -the last pitcher in major League Baseball to win 30 plus games in a season. McLain won 31 games in 1968 and he played for the London Majors in 1974.

My most memorable year in baseball was in 1975. In 1975 the London Majors won the pennant and the IBL CHAMPIONSHIP. Former Major League pitcher Mike Kilkenny pitched for the London Majors that year and he won eleven games and lost none. Kilkenny was the best pitcher I ever played with or against during my career in the IBL. In 1984 I was asked to come out of retirement because the Majors were short a few players. I decided to play a few games for the Majors in 1985 until the time they could find a few more guys to play.

When I showed up to Labatt Park to play in my first game out of retirement they asked me to be the catcher for the game. I hadn't caught a game in over 15 years, so needless to say I was shocked when they asked me to be the catcher in my first game back.

However, being the kind of team guy that I was I said, no problem. Now here was the kicker and what happened next became the greatest thrill of my life in baseball. I was told that I would be catching Fergie Jenkins today. I was shocked and thrilled and all at the same time. I ended up catching Fergie Jenkins for seven innings on a day when it had to be over 90 degrees and needless to say I was suffering from the heat and you have to remember that I hadn't played in a baseball game for almost five years.

Fergie Jenkins was a true professional on that day and he treated me like we knew each other for our entire lifetime. Once the game started it didn't take long for me to find out why he was such a great pitcher. Fergie didn't throw that hard but he had total control and command of every pitch he threw. I can tell you very honestly, that on this day Fergie very seldom threw a strike that the batters could hit. Almost every pitch he threw on this day was just on the plate or just off the plate by an inch or so. I could have sat in a rocking chair and caught Fergie Jenkins. Just one last comment - Fergie never shook me off once all day.

Enjoy the photo of one of the greatest pitchers in baseball and one of the nicest humans beings you could ever meet.

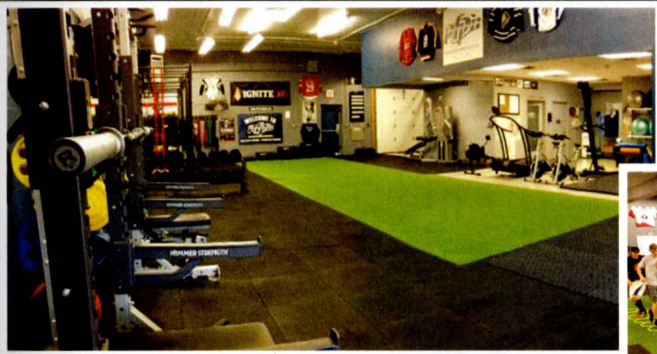

A London Tradition Since 1925



The Intercounty Baseball League has been a part of summer in Southern Ontario for 99 years now and for its 100th season, the League is venturing into Eastern Ontario with the admission of the Ottawa Fatcats. Ottawa replaces the Oshawa Dodgers who suspended operations following the 2009 season.

The League has had its ups and downs over the years, but it continues to provide baseball fans with exciting action every summer.

The League began in 1919 with just four teams...Galt, Guelph, Stratford and Kitchener. Despite a rocky start the Inter-County managed to survive its first season.

The rest, as they say is history.

It's a long and rich history too. In the early years the League expanded with London, Brantford, Preston and St. Thomas joining at various times.

By the mid 1930s, the Inter-County had established a reputation as one of Ontario's best amateur leagues. In fact when Stratford won the Ontario Baseball Association title in 1934, it was the League's fifth OBA title in a row.

The League survived the Second World War in good shape, even though many players joined the armed forces. After the war, the League became professional in everything but name.

The Inter-County was considered by the professional ranks as an "outlaw" league at that time. The bidding war for players was fierce, and many ex-major league players came to Ontario looking for a few last baseball bucks.

So many came, in fact, that the League was considered on a par with many minor pro leagues. Great crowds came out to see the games, which were played under floodlights for the first time in the 1950s, and the senior league appointed its first commissioner, John Gillies, a London lawyer and former pitcher in the League.

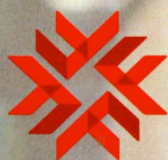

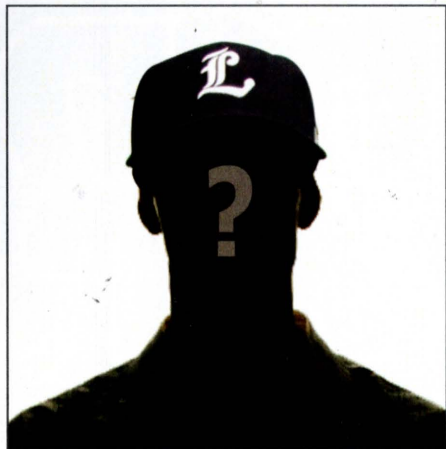

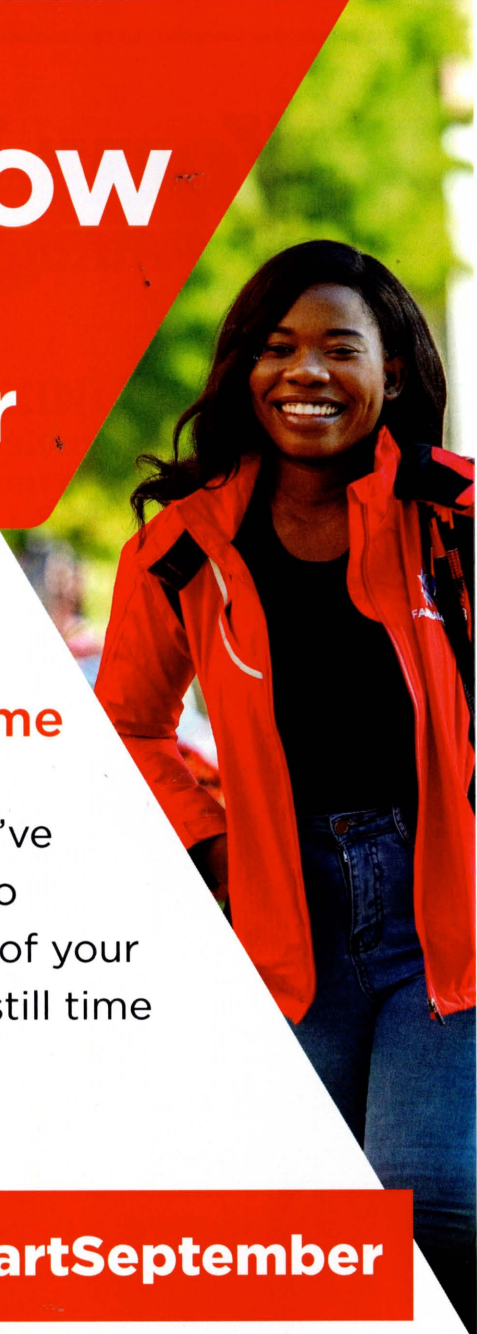
